Twenty-Five SINU Academic Staff Embark on Training at the University of Technology Sydney

Twenty-five academic staff from the Solomon Islands National University (SINU) departed the country on Sunday, 24 November, for a two-week training program at the University of Technology Sydney (UTS) in Australia.

According to Stanley Houma, Manager of the SINU Standards and Quality Office (SQO), the group will participate in training for the Graduate Certificate in Higher Education Teaching and Learning (GCHET&L) from 25 November to 6 December.

Mr. Houma explained that the training in Sydney constitutes the first block of a four-block program, with each block consisting of two units. He elaborated that the GCHET&L program comprises the following blocks and units:

Mr. Houma further stated that Block Two is scheduled to begin in February 2025 at the FAFF Conference Room, Kukum Campus, and the first cohort is expected to complete the program by July 2025.

"Under this plan, the second cohort should begin the program in June or July 2025," he added.

SINU expresses its sincere gratitude to DFAT for funding the program. The SINU Standards and Quality Office will manage the program on behalf of the university, with support from the Pro Vice-Chancellor (Academic) and faculty deans.



- 1. Block one consists of Teaching for Learning and Feedback and Assignment
- 2. Block two consists of Advancing Academic Practice and Student Agency and Teamwork
- 3. Block three consists of Technology Enhanced Learning and Practicing Inclusion
- 4. Block four consists of Course Design and Enhancing Academic Practice


While he congratulated the team for the landmark achievement, Prof.Aqorau encourage the research team to actively implement and lev-

SINU and Ministry of Forestry discuss Poitete land

The Solomon Islands National University (SINU) interest in acquiring land at Poitete in the Western Province has reached a significant step following a successful meeting with the Ministry responsible on Tuesday 19 November this year.

SINU team led by Acting Director of Planning Cypriano Nuake met and discussed with the Ministry of Forestry led by Permanent Secretary Richard Raomae discussed SINU's interest in acquiring land at Poitete to support SINU's development aspiration.



According to Mr.Nuake the primary objectives of the land acquisition are; To advance the development of the Forestry School at Poitete, To enhance student learning opportunities, especially for forestry programs, To provide practical learning experiences close to key institutions like KFPL (Kolobangara Forestry Plantation Ltd.) and Eagon at VIRU Harbour which are critical for forestry education.

As highlighted in the discussion, SINU's position are as follows;

SINU emphasized the strategic importance of the Poitete land, highlighting its suitability for developing an ideal learning environment for students in forestry and environmental studies.

SINU expressed a strong interest in acquiring the land for educational and practical purposes, such as field research, forestry training, and student projects.

SINU has already consulted with KFPL Management, and a survey has been conducted to map the existing hectares and an additional 18 hectares of land at Poitete.

KFPL has shown support for SINU's initiative to subdivide the land for security purposes and to advance forestry education in the Solomon Islands.

KFPL has advised SINU to consult with the Ministry of Forestry regarding the forestry allocation at Poitete. Any subdivision of the land would be handled by KFPL.

Mr.Nuake highlighted during the meeting that land at Poitete is suitable for student learning and long term educational learning.

Responding to SINU, PS Raomae said currently the Ministry has no plan to develop or utilize the land at Poitete. Not only that, but the PS also expressed his personal support for the initiative and acknowledged the significance of the location for educational purposes.

The PS also indicated that his Ministry supports SINU's request to subdivide the land to accommodate the University's needs, especially with donor support on the horizon.

With that, the PS said the Ministry's technical team will need to review the proposal internally where he emphasized that, in the event of a subdivision, at least a few Ministry staff should remain on -site to provide technical support.

He also highlighted that in the proximity to KFPL and Eagon was noted as a critical factor, as it provides students with the opportunity for hands-on experience in real-world forestry settings.

With that, PS Raomae requested that the Ministry's team be included in any future SINU site visits to Poitete to ensure they are involved in the decision-making process.

Both parties expressed a strong commitment to moving forward with discussions and to finding a mutually beneficial solution for the land at Poitete. The Ministry of Forestry was supportive of SINU's objectives and agreed to engage in further dialogue to facilitate the process.



New Zealand High Commission Hands Over Valuable Book Collection to SINU Library

Richards' collection includes rare and valuable books, many of which were accumulated during his time in the Solomon Islands and his frequent visits to remote areas like Tikopia. Reflecting on Richards'

motivation, Schwass added, "He wanted these books to be well-cared for, read, and appreciated, especially as they hold such significance for understanding Pacific heritage."

Richards is a former New Zealand diplomat with postings in New York, Hong Kong, Manila, Geneva, Apia, and Honiara. He served as New Zealand's High Commissioner to the Solomon Islands from 1996 to 1999 and played a key role in overseeing New Zealand's aid to Melanesia.

As a historian and ethnographer, Richards has authored numerous works on maritime history and Pacific artifacts. He has also shared his expertise through New Zealand radio programs, international conferences, and seminars. Richards completed a Master of Arts degree at the University of Canterbury, with a thesis titled An Historical Geography of Chatham Island (1962). The Rhys Morgan Richards book collection now holds a place of pride at the SINU Library. This generous donation aligns with the university's mission to provide a platform for learning and cultural preservation.
